ENGL 4532—Skills, Approaches, and Assessment in ESL Syllabus

Description

The course introduces approaches to evaluation and means of assessment of language skills, with special emphasis on English as a Second Language. Specifically, it examines authentic assessments in contrast with standardized assessment and provides students with a range of assessment tools to be used in the future. The course will include readings, interactive lecture, discussion, group work, field research, presentations, and reports to explore the various variables that affect learners' performance on tests such as test formats, cultural background, linguistic skills, and so forth. Ultimately, students will gain a better understanding of the complexities of assessment of English language learners and how these can be faced in a language classroom.

Learning Outcomes

At the conclusion of this course, students should be able to:

- Use basic ESOL terminology.
- Provide criteria for an effective assessment tool.
- Define differences between standardized and alternative assessment tools.
- Develop an understanding of various formal and informal means of evaluating language skills.
- Develop appropriate evaluation tools for various language skills.
- Explain how language learners can be assessed regarding their language proficiency skills.
- Identify and use accommodations for ESL students on standardized tests.
- Develop means of assessing content knowledge for students with limited language skills.
