Aims and Organization: This course provides students with a comprehensive view of the theoretical foundation of second language learning. Readings, responses, and online sites and videos will present the relationship between these foundations and the linguistic approaches to ESL which have grown out of them. Historical perspectives on the development of various ESL approaches give the student an appreciation of the influence of several disciplines, notably psychology, linguistics, psycholinguistics, sociolinguistics, social psychology, and education. Beyond examining the various approaches to language teaching, the student also examines the relationship between first and second language acquisition, investigates cognitive variations of language learners, considers personality and sociocultural variables, and studies the pragmatic functions of language.

Assignments and Written Work: Through discussions and short papers, students will critique the specific characteristics of differing approaches in ESL, examine texts and materials representing various approaches to L2 acquisition, and design and/or choose communication activities representative of the various approaches. Work is covered in the form of modules, ten in all. Students will read selected scholarly articles and portions of the assigned text.
